BOARD CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The mandate of Richmond Family Place is to "Ensure all children in Richmond meet their full potential". What does this mean? What does it look like? Our goal is to build relationships of trust – this is the heart of the work we do in family resource programs.

We need to understand and respond to the needs of the family holistically in order for this to take place. As participants in the community, we work alongside other like minded organizations to understand, advocate for and provide support for our families. It can be very difficult for a parent that has questions, challenges or issues, to deal with the needs of their children. Life can be very distracting and when you add complications such as affordable housing, the cost of putting food on the table and many other stressful factors, it can be overwhelming at times.

We can't do this work in isolation. It means active participation within our community to ensure effective collaborations with other agencies that have similar intentions and, sitting together at community tables to discuss the emerging issues facing young children in Richmond. We work together to provide enhanced service delivery by all participants through collaborations such as our very successful Refugee Mental Health program, working alongside clinicians from Touchstone Family Association, Richmond Addictions Services Society, City of Richmond, and Vancouver Costal Health to deliver supports in non-traditional ways, breaking down barriers to access for these valuable services. Also, through the Success by 6 funded City Centre Collaborative Early Years project, staff from these 5 agencies work together to deliver programs such as Make the Connection with the Infant Development Program and Toddler Time with Richmond Public Library and Touchstone Family Association.

The goal is to establish and support a family-focused; "Every Door is the Right Door" network of Early Years Centre's that ensures access to consistent information about programs and services for families/ caregivers with young children in Richmond. This network includes a main Early Year's Centre at Richmond Public Library; satellite branches (Community Centres, health services, library branches, Strong Start, and Early Years service providers etc.) and a web-based early year's satellite called RichmondKids.ca

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



MAIN SITE

Located at Debeck House and Ash Street, our main site, is a place for families to come and make new friends, support their children's learning in a safe environment and to share experiences with others. Our drop in programs saw over 10,600 individual visits! Families experienced the joy of playing, the support of skilled workers and a variety of education opportunities through our partnerships with the greater Richmond Community.

Special events included an Easter egg hunt, Santa Breakfast, Family Summer BBQ, Blueberry Picking field trip, picnics in the park and many more! A reorganization of our playroom and new toys and supplies have added sparkle to the playroom.

BRIDGING

The Richmond early years bridging program provides intensive early childhood focused settlement and development support to young refugee children 0-6 years of age and their caregivers. The overall goal of the program is to help transition this population into mainstream services and resources. We continued to have cultural brokers working alongside staff to provide culturally-sensitive peer to peer support to help build a bridge between families and the wider community. This year we saw more than 150 individuals from all over the world, Iraq, Syria, Yemen, Mexico, Congo, Africa, Eretria, Somalia, Uzbekistan, China, Kenya, Egypt and Palestine with approximately 2500 visits to the Bridging program, with parenting programs such as Change ways, Self-Care and Understanding Children's Development and Building Social Skills for Children. The ultimate success of this program lies in our strong partnerships with Touchstone Family Association, City of Richmond, Richmond Addiction Services Society and Vancouver Coastal Mental Health, with their support, families received Mental Health & Addictions Support and Information.



MAKE THE CONNECTION

We ran three 9 week programs, in partnership with Richmond Society of Community Living, 2 in English and 1 in Mandarin for parents with children 0-1 yr. This parent/child interactive education program, facilitated in partnership with the Infant Development Program, helps new parents understand the importance of attachment and building healthy connection with their newborn.





ADDITIONAL MOTHER GOOSE

The Parent-Child Mother Goose Program[®] is a group experience for parents, their babies and young children. The program introduced adults and children to the pleasure and power of using rhymes, songs, and stories together at King George and Steveston Parks. Parents gain skills and confidence which can enable them to create positive family patterns during their children's crucial early years.

BIRTHDAY PARTIES







Richmond Family Place continues to host weekend birthday parties throughout the year! The response from families is fantastic and they appreciate what we are able to provide. We offer a playroom party and a bouncy castle party! Our birthday party facilitators offer set up help and are on site during the entire time interacting with the children. We are excited about continuing this service for the community!

THRIFT STORE

The Richmond Family Place Thrift Store is a staple in the community. It not only provides revenue to help keep our programs going, it also helps to reach vulnerable families in Richmond. The thrift store regularly donates clothing and household items to families, as well as Canada Comforts to assist impoverished children in developing countries. The Thrift Store would not be where it is today without the hard work of all of our dedicated volunteers, the help from Brad's Junk Removal, Councillor Ken Johnston from the City of Richmond and Big Brothers. Also a big Thank You to the community of Richmond for continuing to donate. This year the Thrift Store raised a total of \$32,000 with \$9,340 worth of outgoing donations to families in need.





PROGRAMS

NOBODY'S PERFECT

This 6-week program was delivered in the summer to parents of children 0-6yrs. Parents engaged in education through discussion to find strategies regarding how to find their own parenting style and strengths and received support and encouragement from other parents.

FOOD SECURITY

With child poverty rates continuing to soar within Richmond, Family Place continues to make food based programs a priority. Through our partnership with the Richmond Food Bank, The Sharing Farm, our community food cupboard, our bridging programs, our Wednesday dinner program and Saturday Dad's Breakfast, we continue to offer healthy meals and food education to our families with over 4,900 meals served.

TODDLER TIME FOR CHINESE SPEAKING FAMILIES

This program ran in partnership with Touchstone Family Association and the Richmond Public Library. It continues in popularity and growth for families with children 10mths to 2 yrs. Parents have an opportunity to connect and receive support through education, play and referrals.

PARENT CONNECTIONS

The Parent Connections Program is designed to promote connection and belonging. Through the building of meaningful relationships, isolation is overcome and community engagement and community capacity are increased.

By participating in an 8-week training opportunity, adults interested in working with families and children ages 0-6years old, build the skills and gain the knowledge to contribute to the Richmond Family Place community through supporting roles in our programs.

Connecting as equals, giving and receiving mutual empowerment and growing in confidence, participants in the program become skilled Peer Supporters, building intentional relationships with others who have a common lived experience, such as, parenting, immigration, or health issues.
